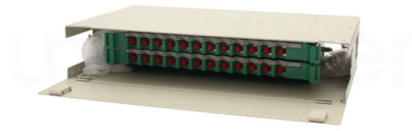

Each FTB should be firmly anchored using expansion screws or other appropriate fixings, and fibers must be routed without sharp bends or stress points.
