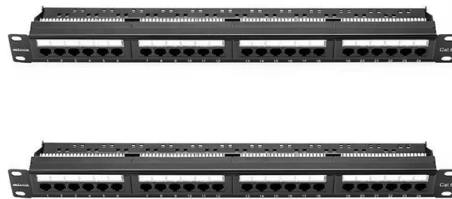

Improperly maintained light fixtures, such as fluorescent or incandescent fixtures with missing covers or bulbs (OSHA/NFPA guidelines). Risks Exposed wiring increases the likelihood of: Electrical shocks to anyone near the box. Short circuits and fire hazards, especially if combustible materials are nearby. Code violations, as OSHA and NFPA require that energized wiring above 50 volts be insulated and protected if within reach (typically below eight feet). Prevention and Safety Measures To prevent exposure: Always use properly rated enclosures for distribution boxes, considering IP or NEMA ratings for indoor or outdoor use. Ensure all covers are securely installed and intact. Maintain neat wiring and insulation, with proper grounding and cable management. Include circuit protection devices like breakers or fuses to reduce risk in case of faults. Conduct regular inspections to identify and correct any exposed wiring before it be...
